

Warner Library Collection Development Policy

The Warner Library in keeping with its mission to be a center for lifelong learning provides an up-to-date collection of print, audiovisual and digital materials that are carefully selected, systematically arranged and vigorously promoted. These materials offer education, entertainment and enrichment.

The Library creates its collection in partnership with the community it serves, the villages of Tarrytown and Sleepy Hollow, seeking input and recommendations on the content we should acquire. We closely monitor demand and how our collections are used and respond accordingly to best meet the needs of our patrons.

Scope of Collection

The collection serves local residents from infancy through adulthood.

The Children's Collection serves children through sixth grade, as well as parents, caregivers, teachers and professionals involved in service to children.

The Young Adult Collection, focuses on the informational and recreational needs of adolescents (12-18); additional materials for young adults can be found throughout the entire adult collection.

The Adult Collection serves adults of all ages and includes a range of materials: books in print and digital formats, DVDs, CDs, streamed and downloaded materials. Non-fiction is typically acquired at an introductory through community college level.

The library has a local history collection focused on historical events, cultural institutions, biographical information of citizens that have contributed to the community as well as the growth and development of the villages of Sleepy Hollow and Tarrytown.

We currently provide materials in the following formats: periodicals, print books (paperback and hardcover), electronic books, books on CD, preloaded audiobooks, e audio books, graphic novels, large print, DVDs, Blu Ray DVDs, Music CDs, and downloadable music as well as a vertical file and local history collection.

A Spanish Language collection is maintained in print, CD Audio, preloaded audiobooks, music CD and DVDs.

Criteria for selection

Artistic or Literary Merit

Curricular enrichment
Reputation or qualifications of author or producer
Local interest in subject or author
Sleepy Hollow, Tarrytown or Westchester history
Scarcity of library material on the subject

Westchester Library System Participation/ILL

Warner Library is a member of the Westchester Library System (WLS), a consortium of 38 member libraries. The holdings of all participating libraries are in one catalog and available for borrowing by Warner Library patrons. The holdings of member libraries may influence the decision to purchase certain materials. WLS may order books unavailable in member libraries through a nationwide interlibrary loan system. Fees may apply to out of system loans.

Collection Evaluation and Maintenance

Once materials have been added to the library's collection, they are managed through an assessment and evaluation process to ensure that they are up to date, balanced, attractive and that space limitations are properly managed. Items are identified for replacement, retention or de-selection. Library staff use professional judgement and independent measures (e.g. circulation reports) to decide which items to retain, replace, repair or de-select.

De-selection (removing items from the collection) is an integral part of collection development. De-selected items will, at the Library's discretion, be donated to the Friends of the Warner Library for book sales or recycled. The library retains those materials that continue to have an enduring or permanent significance to its mission.

General criteria for retaining, replacing, repairing or de-selecting include:

Usage
Historical significance, interest or value
Physical condition
Cost to repair item relative to its value
Relative usefulness of item
Space considerations
Superseded, inaccurate or out-of-date content
